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Dear Parents and Carers,

You will be aware our school has been participating in a process of **External Validation** since the start of Term 2. This process came to a close today when the school executive met with the members of the **external validation panel** to review and discuss:

- the outcomes of the school's self-assessment based on the School Excellence Framework
- the evidence gathered by our EV teams to support our judgements and
- the next steps we believe we should take in order to achieve our vision for the school.

Schools participate in the process of External Validation every four years. While it is rather time consuming and undoubtedly places additional demands on the staff, it is also extremely valuable to have the opportunity to receive objective feedback from the EV panel members. I am very pleased to be able to report that the panel were not only very affirming of the strategies and initiatives linked to our current Strategic Improvement Plan but also provided us with high

quality advice and suggestions regarding the future directions for Rathmines Public. I take this opportunity to publicly thank **Matt Elston**, **Patrick Wild** and **Troy McNamara** for the time and effort they contributed to fulfilling their EV responsibilities and offer particular thanks to **Cathie Ruecroft** for the very professional manner in which she lead our executive team through the EV process. Cathie and I are looking forward to sharing the key outcomes with parents and carers at the next meeting of the P and C Association.

#### **School Concert Update**

We are fortunate to be working within the Level 2 COVID restrictions rather than the more severe restrictions being experienced by school communities in the Greater Western Sydney area. The impact on the day to day operation of our school has been relatively minor but unfortunately the current restrictions have had a significant impact on the organisation of our School Concert Movie Night. Members of our school community will already be aware that the timeframe for rehearsing, filming and presenting "A Night in the Library" has had to be adjusted in order to comply with the COVID restrictions. Members of our school concert committee met last week to develop a revised plan which will focus on rehearsals resuming in week eight (beginning Monday 30<sup>th</sup> August), filming of concert items in week three of next term, and the School Concert Movie being presented on **Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> November**.

One of the challenges associated with the production of the Concert Movie is the time that needs to be allowed for the production company to edit the filmed items. In addition managers of the theatre complex need to have access to the movie for a minimum of two weeks prior to the "premiere". If the current restrictions continue **beyond 28th August** we will probably have to revert back to presenting the concert in the school hall over three nights as we have done in past years. The concert performances would be held towards the end of term four if the COVID restrictions in place at the time allow for large gatherings indoors.

#### **COVID Guidelines**

We have received a number of enquiries from parents and carers regarding the rules that apply to situations where children and/or adults have entered areas with higher levels of restrictions (e.g. Greater Sydney area including Central Coast) and then returned to regional NSW (e.g. Rathmines). The following extract from department guidelines highlight the key points:

"If you live in regional and rural areas, you must not enter Greater Sydney including the Blue Mountains, Central Coast, Wollongong and Shellharbour local government areas unless you have a reasonable excuse.

Facilitating attendance at school (where the student cannot learn from home) or to attend early childhood education is a reasonable excuse to enter Greater Sydney under the Public Health Order.

Facilitating arrangements for access to and contact between parents and children or siblings is also a reasonable excuse to enter Greater Sydney under the Public Health Order.

If you enter these areas for any reason, <u>stay at home rules</u> will apply to you for 14 days after you were last in any of these areas.

This means that you will need to stay at your place of residence for 14 days, even if it is in a regional area, unless you have a reasonable excuse. Attending school or early childhood education is a reasonable excuse.

At all times, please continue to:

closely monitor for symptoms for COVID-19 and immediately get tested should you have the mildest of symptoms, regardless of where you live or attend school. If you get tested for COVID-19 because you have symptoms or if you have been directed by NSW Health to do so, you must isolate at home until you receive your test result. refer to the <a href="NSW Government list of case locations">NSW Government list of case locations</a>, and act on advice from NSW Health if you have been to any of these venues."

The <u>stay at home rules</u> which apply when a person returns from Greater Sydney can be accessed on the NSW Health website. I trust that the information set out above will assist parents and carers who have experienced some uncertainty about the current Health Orders relating to entering the Greater Sydney area.

#### Kinder 2022 Enrolments

The Catalina kids transition program for the children starting in Kinder at Rathmines next year is continuing each Friday morning and it has been really pleasing to observe how the children are becoming more relaxed and confident in the school setting. Our kinder teachers are eager to ensure that all children who are to start their primary schooling at Rathmines next year have the chance to participate in this valuable transition experience. I encourage any parents who may not have contacted the school office about a potential kinder 2022 enrolment to do so as soon as possible and also urge school community members to "spread the word" about our kinder enrolment and transition process being underway.

#### **Sports News**

The extension to the lockdown in Greater Sydney has resulted in the **Westlakes Athletics Carnival** being postponed once again in order to accommodate student athletes who live in the Central Coast area. The new date for the Zone Carnival is **Monday 30<sup>th</sup> August**. The Hunter carnival has also been postponed and will now take place on **Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> September**. While these changes to the PSSA calendar are inconvenient, we are clearly fortunate not to be trying to manage the learning from home challenges currently being faced by school communities in the Greater Sydney area.

The children who have been trying out for the school's representative basketball teams have no doubt been inspired by the achievements of our Olympic basketballers in Tokyo. 


















# **WONAI GROUP**

#### **DEBATING NEWS**



We have now completed two rounds of the Premier's Debating Challenge by Zoom with mixed results even though both our debating teams, the Rathmines Raiders and the Rathmines Rockstars, have debated well. Our very capable **School Debating Officials (Berrick and Miah)** were ably assisted by Mr Ruecroft's IT expertise.

Due to the availability of schools, Round 2 was held before Round 1 and this was against Bonnells Bay School on Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> July.

The first debate on the day was between Bonnells Bay Fives as the Affirmative and **Rathmines Raiders** (**Mackenzie**, **Marli**, **Dustin and Ben**) as the Negative team. The topic was 'That Year 5 and 6 classes should set a side 20 minutes each day to watch and discuss the news'.

The Affirmative team mainly argued that it is important for kids need to know the truth of what's happening. In the more difficult side of the argument, due to students already watching BTN, the Raiders argued that some students could be distressed by what they could see. This could be due to immaturity or sensitivities.

The adjudicator acknowledged the closeness of the debate but awarded it to Bonnells Bay Fives – Affirmative.

That debate was immediately followed by the debate between Bonnells Bay Sixes and Rathmines Rockstars (Makenna, Chelsey, Zen and Riley). Again Rathmines were the Negative team with the topic 'That we should allow kids in Year 5 and above to use social media sites like Facebook, Instagram and Twitter'.

In this debate, Bonnells Bay argued that 11 year olds can learn to manage the possible dangers of social media and can block inappropriate sites. The Rockstars were quick to pick up that not all students in Year 5 are 11 and that the topic did not mention 11 years of age, only Years 5 and 6. This is an important point in debating. Debaters must debate the actual topic! The Rockstars went on to argue, among many other strong points, that young children are too young to fully understand the dangers and deal with them.

Again, a close debate with the Rockstars - Negative declared the winning team.

Yesterday, 4<sup>th</sup> August, we were able to complete Round 1 when we debated against Coal Point School.

In the first Zoom debate against Coal Point Gold, the **Rockstars** (**Zen, Ruby, Chelsey and Makenna**) were the Affirmative team with the topic 'That every class in primary school should adopt a dog or a cast as a class pet'

The Rockstars argued that it has been proven having a pet can reduce stress and improve mental health and that the risk of allergic reactions would be a prime consideration in the chosen breed of the pet whilst the Coal Point Gold argued that pets can be aggressive and would require training taking time away from learning.

This week's adjudicator commented on the quality of the debate and declared the Rockstars-Affirmative as the winning team.

Again, we followed this with second debate, the Raiders (Marli, Dustin, Isabella and Mackenzie) against the Coal Point Black team. The topic was 'That primary schools should have a three day weekend' with the Raiders being the Affirmative team.

# **DEBATING NEWS (Cont'd)**

The Raiders argued that three day weekends would give kids more time with family and more time to spend in other recreational activities thus reducing stress. Coal Point argued that if students were away from school for an extra day, they would forget what they had previously learned, that the curriculum could not fit into just 4 days per week and that teachers would have their pay reduced.

In what was a very close debate, the adjudicator awarded the debate to Coal Point Black - Negative.

As the coaches, we are really looking forward to seeing the progress in our teams' debating skills with both teams having two more debates each to come. The last debate is Raiders v Rockstars which will make for a very exciting finish to the Debating Challenge. We will report on the results in our next newsletter.

#### **UNWELL STUDENTS**

If your child shows <u>any</u> signs of being unwell please keep them home. If they have any of the following symptoms they must have a COVID test—

- ⇒ Runny nose
- ⇒ Sore throat
- ⇒ Cough
- ⇒ Temperature above 37.4

Once they have received a negative result and their symptoms have resolved, they are free to return to school. A screenshot of the negative result should be emailed to rathmines-p.school@det.nsw.edu.au

If your child has <u>diarrhea or has vomited</u>, they must wait for 24 hours after the last episode before returning to school.


