I was very pleased to be able to spend two days with our Year 6 students during their **Elizabeth Beach Outdoor Education Camp** at Pacific Palms during week four. The children are to be commended not only for their behaviour but also for the positive and

supportive sense of class spirit they displayed throughout the trip, especially when torrential rain hit our campsite on Thursday night just before the final item in the "Talent Quest". In addition to the wet weather, the camp challenges included: a beach, headland and rainforest walk from midway along Seven Mile Beach back to the campsite at Elizabeth Beach; wading races, beach flags and "classical catches"; taking down and packing up wet and battered tents after surviving the deluge, and sand crab spotting in the rain at dawn on Friday morning.

The trip back to Rathmines on Friday included a short stopover in Forster to walk along the break wall and check out the beautiful harbour. As a bonus, a pod of dolphins and a small shark made an appearance while the children were waiting for their lunches to be delivered! Behaviour Code for Students

The Behaviour Code for Students which has been formulated by the NSW Department of Education is a valuable guide for all students in terms of the school's expectations for student behaviour. I encourage parents and carers to read through and discuss the code with their children.

"NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive and responsive learning environments for everyone. We teach and model the behaviours we value in our students. In NSW public schools' students are expected to:

- * Respect other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- * Follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- * Strive for the highest standards in learning

* Respect all members of the school community and show courtesy to all students, teachers and community members

- * Resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- * Comply with the school's uniform policy or dress code
- * Attend school every day (unless legally excused)

* Respect all property

* Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our schools

* Not bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our schools

Schools take strong action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or to the achievement of high-quality teaching and learning".

School Sport

Students at Rathmines Public are fortunate to be able to participate in a wide variety of sporting opportunities which are provided as part of an overall sports program for students in primary classes. I

believe there is value in taking time to highlight not only the different aspects of this program, but also the guidelines which the school is required to follow. **Miss Case** and **Mrs Wicks** have accepted responsibility for overseeing all matters relating to primary sport, as well as organising our annual Swimming, Cross Country and Athletics carnivals. I thank Niesa and Ellouise in advance for all the time and effort they will contribute to fulfilling their Sports Coordinator roles during the 2025 school year. Rathmines Public enters teams in eleven different PSSA competitions and also participates in competitions run by NSW Touch, the Northern NSW Football Association, NSW OZ tag and the Newcastle Knights. Inclusion in these representative sporting teams is based on the outcome of schoolbased selection trials and guidelines provided by the NSW PSSA. Students who gain selection in a team are required to display a high level of commitment to training sessions, before or after school, and to also display the highest level of sportsmanship and team spirit when playing for the school.

In addition, students with above average ability in a particular sport are eligible to take part in **zone selection trials** conducted by the Westlakes PSSA. Selection in a Westlakes squad is the first step on a pathway to possible selection in a **NSW PSSA** representative team. In the same way, students who are selected to represent RPS at the zone swimming, cross country and athletics carnivals as a result of their performances at a school carnival, have the chance to progress through to Hunter and possibly NSW PSSA representation. It is important to note that the NSW PSSA is responsible for setting the guidelines for selection procedures. Strict limitations are placed on the number of students who can participate at each level of the selection process. Emphasis is placed on the fact that participants must have demonstrated **above average ability** in the sport, and as a result would usually have previous competition experience which has led to selection in a representative team. Details regarding a student's previous playing experience are used in conjunction with school-based selection trials to determine the school's nominations for a Zone trial. Parents are asked to note the following additional points when they are considering nominating their child for inclusion in a Zone trial:

(1) Zone Convenors are nominated by the local PSSA for the conducting of each trial. The Convenors are responsible for supervision of students during the trial.

(2) Parents are responsible for transporting their children to and from the trials.

(3) It is mandatory for all students to wear the appropriate safety gear relating to the sport.

(4) If parents have any concerns about the conducting of a trial, they should speak initially to **Miss Case** or **Mrs Wicks** rather than the Trial Convenor on the day of the trial.

The Westlakes PSSA also conducts a series of annual **Gala Days**, which are **non-competitive**, and are designed to give all primary students the chance to play sport with students from other schools in our zone. These gala days generally run on separate days for junior (Years 3 and 4) and senior (Years 5 and 6) students.

We have high expectations for students in terms of their behaviour on and off the field. Many schools associated with the **NSW Primary Schools Sports Association** also have a requirement for parents and carers to sign a **Parents/Spectators Code of Conduct** prior to their children being granted permission to represent the school in a sports event. It is really pleasing to be able to say that parents and carers in the Rathmines school community have overwhelmingly displayed the highest standards of personal conduct when supporting any of our sporting teams and as a result I have not considered it necessary to

implement that practice. However, I believe it is beneficial to take time each year to highlight and hopefully raise the awareness of the following expectations we have in this regard:

*Focus on your child's efforts and performance rather than winning and losing.

* Remember that children participate in sport for their enjoyment and fulfilment.

* Provide a model of good sports behaviour for your child to copy and always remember that children learn by example.

* Appreciate and applaud good performances and skilful play by all participants.

* Be courteous and respectful in your communication with players, coaches and game officials.

* Support all efforts to remove verbal abuse from sporting venues.

* Show appreciation for teacher-coaches and officials who give up their time to provide sporting opportunities for students at our school. Without them your child would not have the opportunity to participate.

* Respect the decisions made by officials and teach your children to do the same.

*Do not coach from the sideline.

*Never ridicule or yell at a child for making a mistake or losing a game.

*Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every person regardless of their gender, ability, age, cultural background, or religion.

I strongly encourage all parents and carers to reflect on these expectations whenever they attend a sporting event in which their child is representing Rathmines Public School.

School Debating

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
Toronto High School Yr 7 2026



UNWELL STUDENTS

If your child shows <u>any</u> **signs of being unwell please keep them home**. If they have any of the following symptoms they must also have a COVID test—

Runny nose Sore throat Cough Temperature above 37.4 Diarrhoea/Nausea/Vomiting Conjunctivitis



If they have a negative result and their symptoms have resolved, they are free to return to school. If they test **Positive** they must **stay home** until symptoms have gone.

If your child has <u>diarrhoea or vomiting</u>, they must <u>wait 24 hours</u> after the last episode before returning to school, provided they have received a negative Covid test result.

PLEASE REMEMBER TO ADVISE THE SCHOOL VIA THE APP OF YOUR CHILD'S ABSENCE.

Head Lice

Please check your children's hair <u>regularly</u> and treat immediately if you suspect an unwelcome visitor.

ABSENCE NOTIFICATIONS

If your child is absent from school, you can notify the school three ways -

- Use the Sentral for Parents app to lodge an absence
- Respond to the SMS that is sent by the school on the day, and give a reason for the absence
- Write a note to the class teacher giving the absence date and reason.

All absence notifications must be in writing, therefore please **DO NOT RING THE SCHOOL** as verbal notifications cannot be accepted.
