Autism Awareness Day

The interaction between the students in our three special education support classes and students in the mainstream classes, is one of the most positive and important elements within our school culture. Each and every day the teachers and staff within the unit highlight the aspect of our school vision statement, which refers to "pursuing and celebrating excellence in all areas and ensuring everyone has the opportunity to experience success within a supportive, safe and engaging learning environment." The Special Education staff raise our students' awareness and understanding of the additional challenges and opportunities encountered by our special education students. They also play a leading role in the coordination of school wide celebrations, such as Autism Awareness Day. The following report by Mr Wild and the accompanying photos highlight the impact of the most recent celebration:

"The 2nd of April was World Autism Awareness Day and in true Rathmines PS style it was celebrated with enthusiasm and respect. School wide, students and teachers wore blue to show support for people with Autism. In class, students watched some videos and took part in lessons which focussed in on how our community can show acceptance towards people with Autism.

The whole school gathered for an assembly after lunch where the school entered to the music of Alex the Astronaut, a musician who has Autism and has been open about how she manages her flourishing musical career and living with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD).



Four brave Gems were then interviewed on stage; William, Leo, Chelsea and Mikayleigh shared with everyone the parts of school they love, parts of school that they find challenging, how their community could help them and what they'd like to be when they grow up.

I asked if the audience agreed with the answers on stage, hands went up everywhere. We all have successes and challenges in our lives. With the support of a school community, our celebrations are

louder and our challenges smoother. On behalf of the 12% of Rathmines PS students who have Autism, I would like to thank the Rathmines PS community for their support on this special day and their acceptance, every day".

UNWELL STUDENTS

If your child shows <u>any</u> signs of being unwell please keep them home. If they have any of the following symptoms they must also have a COVID test—

- Runny nose
- Sore throat
- Cough
- Temperature above 37.4
- Diarrhoea/Nausea/Vomiting
- Conjunctivitis

If they have a negative result and their symptoms have resolved, they are free to return to school. If they test **Positive** they must **stay home** until symptoms have gone.

If your child has **diarrhoea or vomiting**, they must **wait 24 hours** after the last episode before returning to school, **provided they have received a negative Covid test result**.

PLEASE REMEMBER TO ADVISE THE SCHOOL VIA THE APP OF YOUR CHILD'S ABSENCE.

Head Lice

Please check your children's hair <u>regularly</u> and treat immediately if you suspect an unwelcome visitor.

ABSENCE NOTIFICATIONS

If your child is absent from school, you can notify the school three ways -

- Use the Sentral for Parents app to lodge an absence
- Respond to the SMS that is sent by the school on the day, and give a reason for the absence
- Write a note to the class teacher giving the absence date and reason.

All absence notifications must be in writing, therefore please **DO NOT RING THE SCHOOL** as verbal notifications cannot be accepted.

Supporting Families: Accessing Additional Support

The following information discusses abuse, neglect, and family violence. If these topics are distressing for you, please take care while reading.

Additional Child Care Subsidy (ACCS) provides extra help with the cost of approved childcare. ACCS is available for children who are considered to be at risk of serious abuse or neglect or have already been assessed as being at risk under state or territory law. This can be a result of being subject to, or exposed to, one or more of the following:

- · serious physical, emotional or psychological abuse
- · sexual abuse
- · domestic or family violence
- neglect

ACCS is also available for children who are considered to be at risk due to their living arrangements. A child is also considered to be at risk if they are:

- · in formal foster care
- · in a formal kinship agreement
- · on a long-term protection order

Active OOSH is dedicated to providing assistance to ensure that every child has a safe and nurturing environment. If you need support or would like to learn more about ACCS, please don't hesitate to reach out to us confidentially.
